

L.M. Montgomery's Short Stories: A Preliminary Bibliography

Although four collections of L.M. Montgomery's short stories have been published, two in her lifetime and two since – *Chronicles of Avonlea* (1912, 12 stories); *Further Chronicles of Avonlea* (1920, 15 stories); *The Road to Yesterday* (1974, 14 stories); and *The Doctor's Sweetheart and Other Stories* (1979, 14 stories) – the great number of stories she published in various magazines and newspapers has hardly been touched. And, except for *The Watchman and Other Poems* (1916), her vast output of poetry has, as far as I know, never been collected.

In the summer of 1978, while visiting Montgomery's birthplace in P.E.I., I was shown twelve scrapbooks of her short stories and poems that she had put together. The trustees of the birthplace knew of their existence, because four of the scrapbooks were on display, but no particular scholarly attention had been paid to them apart from their use by Father Bolger in *The Years before "Anne"*. Montgomery's son, Dr. Stuart Macdonald, arranged for Father Francis Bolger of the University of Prince Edward Island to xerox all the scrapbooks. Copies were sent to Dr. Macdonald, who passed them on to me.

There were 396 stories in the twelve scrapbooks and as many poems. However, after accounting for stories which appeared in the scrapbooks twice (because they had been published in two different magazines), and for stories which are in one of the four published collections, I had xeroxes of 329 previously uncollected stories.

This seemed like quite a good basis for a complete collection, but Dr. Macdonald then showed me a booklet in which Montgomery had listed numerically 517 stories, as well as 516 poems! (She had also recorded the amount she had received for each story and poem.) This list had probably not been made until 7 February 1921, the point at which the first total of earnings was made, with 427 stories and 431 poems published. Thereafter, totals were made on 1 May 1926, 26 April 1929, 8 April 1930, 20 July 1933, 2 June 1937, and 13 February 1939. One final entry is not dated but is probably June 1941.

Although this list was apparently not begun until 1921, it is in roughly chronological order, and was presumably copied from notes kept over the years. No. 1 is "Our Charivari," published in *Golden Days* in May 1896, and although there are a few out of chronological order (no. 412, "A Baking of

Gingersnaps," was published in the *Ladies' Journal* in July 1895), those that at present can be dated run fairly smoothly through the years.

Montgomery's list is of titles and amounts paid; she records no information about place of publication and, except for the approximately chronological ordering, no dates of publication. When one turns to the scrapbooks for more help, there is only sometimes any bibliographical information for the stories in them. Of the twelve sets of Montgomery's clippings, seven are stories cut out of magazines and pasted into bound blank books; in two of these Montgomery has written in the names of the magazines and the year (sometimes the month) of publication. The other five are what I have termed "sewn gatherings," and are full magazine pages sewn or tied together. In most of these the full date as well as the magazine name is available.

When I tried to enumerate the total number of stories I would be dealing with, I ran into another problem. There are stories on Montgomery's numbered list that are not in the scrapbooks and stories in the scrapbooks that are not on the numbered list. In addition, I have in my own files a few stories clipped from anonymous magazines by non-bibliographically-inclined friends, that are in neither place. My most careful calculation so far suggests that there are approximately 560 different stories, but this figure may be somewhat excessive, since some stories that I have not yet seen have titles quite similar to others I have seen and may merely have been published under different titles in different magazines. I base this assumption on several suggestive cases: no. 64, "Akin to Love," was published in the *Canadian Magazine* in December 1909 (collected in *Doctor's Sweetheart*), but had been published as "The Courtship of Josephine" in the *Springfield Republican* in August 1901. And is no. 481, "Aunt Marcella" (which I have yet to find), the same story as "What Aunt Marcella Would Have Called It" (which is in one of the scrapbooks, but with no bibliographical information)? Such cases have, of course, bibliographical importance regardless of their bearing on the number of different stories Montgomery published.

The only possible process of investigation seems to be leafing through turn-of-the-century magazines and newspapers. From the scrapbooks I have a preliminary list of over 130 such periodicals. The work I have done so far in the Library of Congress, the Boston Public Library, and the Metropolitan Toronto Library has been most fruitful but is by no means completed. When I find a story that is not in the scrapbooks I xerox it and add it to my collection.

I expect to be ready to publish a fairly complete bibliography of the short stories within a year or two. (I am for the moment concentrating on the stories, but I have as a matter of course noted any appearances of

Montgomery's poems I come upon in searching through the magazines and will continue to do so.) When the bibliography has been finished it will mean that a virtually complete collection of the short stories will then be available. The complete collection will include those stories which some of us would probably prefer to ignore, those written for young children in Sunday School publications: "Dimple's Flowers" and "How Dottie and Tottie Made Up," for example. Although Montgomery wrote much less in the "I wuv 'oo, muvver" vein than most of her contemporaries publishing in the same magazines, the vein is there and should not, I think, be overlooked in an examination of her complete work. Besides, in comparison with her contemporaries, she writes in that vein very well.

Organizing a bibliography of this sort has to be done with the user in mind. Some scholars, working on the history of small magazines, would want a list sorted by the name of the magazine. Someone interested in Montgomery's development would prefer a chronological listing. And anyone who has turned up a story from an unknown source would need an alphabetical list. This preliminary list of the stories for which I have found complete bibliographical information has been done chronologically. (When stories have been published twice, they are cross-indexed.) The final study will be available in any order.

The bibliography has been arranged in six columns. The first column indicates the number of the scrapbook in which the story was found. (These are numbers that I assigned arbitrarily to the scrapbooks.) As well as the numbers 1 to 12, there are some "RW" entries. These are stories that I have found and xeroxed and have in my files. The second column lists the number that Montgomery herself assigned to each story (although, as I said before, she did not list all the stories I know of in her numbered list). A sorting done by these numbers shows a rough chronological order. The third column has the title of the story, the fourth the title of the magazine, and the fifth the date of publication. Because of the programming of the sort feature, it is necessary that the dates in the fifth column appear with the year first, the month second. When a story has been published twice with the same title, I add "also" and the other date to each entry. If the story was published under another title, the entry would read, for example, "The Girl and the Wild Race, *Era*, 1904, 1; also as *Race for a Wife*, 1909, 9." The abbreviations in the final column indicate the published collection where some of the stories eventually appeared (CA=*Chronicles of Avonlea*; FCA=*Further Chronicles of Avonlea*; RY=*Road to Yesterday*; DS=*Doctor's Sweetheart*), and also provide information that reveals an interesting aspect of Montgomery's writing. An asterisk marks stories she re-used in her novels. (I trust that the abbreviations used for the novels will be clear to anyone using this list.) Montgomery fleshed out some of her novels with stories that had been published separately years before, changing the names to suit the new

context. For example, "Miss Marietta's Jersey," *Household*, 1899, 7, was used in *Anne of Avonlea* in 1909.

I hope that this preliminary listing, brief as it is, will be of interest to scholars in several fields, and I trust that the work will be completed in the not too distant future.
